

NOTES FROM THE BOARD

2020 has been such a strange and challenging year for all of us. We are so very grateful for the dedication and adaptability of our Partners, supporters, and volunteers for continuing to devote time and effort to supporting lookout restoration projects. In a year when many activities have been interrupted or canceled, we are happy to report that we still got a significant amount of lookout work done this summer. In total we volunteered more than 2300 hours of labor and more than \$63,000 of in-kind value to our Agency Partners.

One highlight of this year's activities was a socially distanced Window Restoration workshop where 19 windows for Wam Lookout were scraped, painted, glass reinstalled, and re-glazed. We also made one final trip into Mud Lake Lookout in the Bob, to put the finishing touches on a major multi-year project. It is great to see that lookout in secure shape for the future. This summer also saw completion of numerous lookout assessments which will help Agencies make detailed plans for future year projects. Read on to see what we have been up to this year.

Best wishes for you to stay healthy and safe till we can gather together in better times. Remember, a trip to a lookout is always a good way to be socially distanced!



At one time, there were over 8,000 fire lookouts in 49 states. Today, fewer than 2,000 lookouts remain with roughly 400 of those staffed every season. In Montana there are about 130 standing lookouts of the over 600 that once existed.


But where can I get information on all the standing lookouts in Montana? What about the entire United States? While there are several sources, the Forest Fire Lookout Association works in conjunction with American Resources Inc. to support the National Historic Lookout Register. This database is user supported so anytime new information becomes available anyone can submit updates and the database will be more current. A companion database is the Former Fire Lookout Sites Register which is an analogous site but for lookout locations where the structure is no longer present.

While Montana has fairly good data for its standing lookouts, after looking at the map for northwest Montana in particular, we found there were approximately 23 lookouts that had no entry in the register. Many more sites where lookouts once stood have no information. The NWMT-FFLA requested and received access to the database so that we can nominate and then create the profile for those 23 lookouts.

That said, anyone with pictures, information, or stories about any of the standing, or former, lookouts in northwest Montana can get in touch with us so that we could use that information to make the Register more complete. There are many lookout sites in our area that have no known pictures. For more information on what data the two registers collect go check out the websites!


2020 Projects

Windows Restoration Workshop

The first major project of the spring was refurbishment of windows for Wam Mountain Lookout. Chuck built a steam box to speed the prep work, and with the help of Rick Davis all 171 panes of glass were removed from 19 windows to begin the restoration process. When we put the call out for a workshop, a great cadre of volunteers stepped up and joined us at the Murphy Lake Ranger Station over two long weekends for the labor intensive process of scraping, resetting the glass, glazing, and ultimately painting these windows in preparation for them to be flown up back to the lookout by the Kootenai Helitack Crew.

The Wam Lookout restoration story continued in June with the Kootenai NF Rapellers preparing the windows with much TLC for transport via helicopter sling load up to the lookout.

McGUIRE LOOKOUT ASSESSMENT

Throughout the summer and fall we continued to put finishing touches on Meadow Peak Lookout in preparation for it being placed in the Recreation.gov program. The tasks included extending handrails to meet OSHA requirements and implementing a way to secure the shutters during winter months. If everything goes as planned and with a few more tweaks, it will be ready for the general public to enjoy in 2021. "I checked out your lookout restoration projects and it really warmed my heart to see Meadow Peak L.O. on the Kootenai N.F. was restored in 2018.

My first job with the FS was lookout on Meadow Peak in 1959. I was on the L.O. from the first of July till the first part of September. I turned in one smoke - turned out to be a barbecue grill at a home on Thompson Lake.

I returned to Meadow Peak about 10 years ago and it was in need of a lot of work.

I had a new awakening about what my new life would be - never had the foggiest idea I would get hooked on fire management as a career.

I had a great summer in 1959 - only 7 fires on the Raven Ranger District. Saw a fanatastic lightning storm to the south - Lolo NF - they ended up with over 300 fires.

Thanks to all who participated in the restoration - it looks much like it was in 1959.




HEAVENS PEAK LOOKOUT ASSESSMENT

A Short History of Lookouts and Glacier National Park's Podcast

In 2018, the Northwest Montana Forest Fire Lookout Association interviewed Kay Rosengren, who, with her husband Keith, staffed Numa Ridge and Apgar Lookouts in Glacier National Park from 1958, 1960, and 1963. Board member, Beth Hodder, and Ann Fagre, association volunteer, recorded Kay's remembered experiences as part of our ongoing oral history project.

Currently, Michael Faist, visual information specialist for Glacier NP, is creating a 15-minute podcast for Glacier about lookouts in Glacier, with strong emphasis on Kay Rosengren's interview.

The Theme of the story will be one of discovery, with a brief history of fire lookouts in the country, and in Glacier, including that author Ed Abbey had worked at Numa Ridge. Michael will include a clip of Karen Reeves, a longtime lookout, recently at Numa Ridge, who suggested Abbey's wife did all the work. Then he will introduce Kay and Keith's Story, with Kay as narrator.

A brief talk with Beth in the podcast discusses the importance of our organization in preserving and maintaining national and state lookouts in northwest Montana, including those in Glacier, the Flathead and Kootenai National Forest, and State lookouts, following the demise of most of the country's 8,000 lookouts.



Also check out our other audio interviews from our website or the U of M archives or download the transcriptions. We hope to have two additional interviews archived soon.

On a side note, Hannah Soukup, oral history curator for the U of M archives, sent an email in October saying, "I looked up the numbers on how many times your interviews with forest fire lookouts have been accessed by researchers. To date, the audio has been downloaded 115 times and live streamed 139 times. That's really wonderful! Thanks for donating them to us." Hannah said that not all the listeners are from Montana. They're from different parts of the United States, some in Germany and other parts of Western Europe, as well as China and Malaysia. So the project has global reach.

We are excited to hear that researchers have discovered our interviews, and that the university finds our oral history project worthwhile.





